

Tipp Fireworks

In 1921, The Tipp Fireworks Co. was formed by J.A. Scheip and J.R. Scheip. Carl Moser Sr. was brought to Tipp City as their salesman. In 1927 the senior Scheip became ill and Carl bought the company. He was known throughout the U.S. as a designer of major fireworks displays. He boasted that no one was ever killed at one of his exhibitions because he exercised every precaution.





The company was located at 245 Fourth St., which is now Indian Creek Fabricators, Inc. It sits on the west side of the street and includes the surrounding buildings.

This picture is of South First Street. The building to the left with only the roof visible is Timmer's Cooperage Shop. The building beside it is the Tippecanoe Grape Sugar Company, and to the far right is Davis Whip.

...the aftermath of the Grape Sugar Co. explosion in 1887. They processed grape sugar, which in powdered form is highly explosive when exposed to air and must be kept away from open flames and areas where electric sparks are possible. The site of the grape company later became Tip Top Canning. This information is from Susan Furlong's book "Tippecanoe To Tipp City The First Hundred Years".
